

## **Mary Sybilla Dooly**

**Feb, 24, 1889 - Nov, 14, 1921**

Mrs. Henry Dooly, nee Mary Sybilla Kubly, mention of whose death was made in these columns last week, first saw the light of day in Sylvester township, Green county, Wis., on Feb, 24, 1889. She was baptized on April 20th of the following year. The days of her youth were spent at the parental home and she obtained her education in the rural schools.

Her parents moved to a farm in Mt. Pleasant township when she was a mere girl and since then she had always lived in or near the village. In the year 1904-05 she was a member of the catechetical class of the Monticello Reformed church and was confirmed on Palm Sunday, April 16, 1905.

Her marriage to Henry Dooly, the husband who survives her, occurred on Dec. 22, 1903. The year following they lived on a farm with her brother, Abraham Kubly, Jr., after which they moved to, Monticello, making their home in the village until a few years ago when they again moved to the country.

Mrs. Dooly had been in frail health for some years, although her condition had never been such as to interfere materially with her household duties. It was the opinion of physicians, however, that an operation would ultimately be necessary to relieve her of her affliction and it was in accordance with this advice that she submitted to an operation at the Monroe hospital.

Her condition appeared favorable following the operation and relatives were encouraged in the belief that she would soon be able to leave the institution and return home. However, cruel fate decreed otherwise and she breathed her last at 8:50 o'clock on the morning of Nov, 14, 1921, at the age of 32 years, 8 months and 20 days.

Mrs. Dooly was a woman of most cheerful disposition and by reason of her many good qualities she endeared herself to young and old alike. Her early demise is deeply deplored by many friends in this vicinity and elsewhere, all of whom extend their sincere sympathy to the sorrowing husband and other bereaved relatives.

Funeral services were held at the home of her parents at 1 o'clock last Thursday afternoon and at 1:30 at the Reformed church, conducted by the Rev. A. Muehlmeier. A large concourse of sorrowing relatives and friends were in attendance and especially noticeable were the many beautiful floral offerings. Burial was in Highland cemetery.

Besides her husband and parents, Mr. and Mrs, Abraham Kubly, Sr. she is survived by five brothers and three sisters.
