## Werner Hefty

Werner T. Hefty, 68, 338 S. Monroe St., Monticello, died unexpectedly at 12:52 am. Sunday, Dec. 26, 1982, from an apparent heart attack. He was pronounced dead on arrival at St. Clare Hospital.
