Mrs. Edward Hefty, Washington. Called Alter Short Illness Funeral Rites Conducted For Well Known Resident

Funeral services for Mrs. Edward C. Hefty, 52 years of age, Washington township, who passed away suddenly in the Wisconsin General hospital, Madison, at about 3:30 o'clock Thursday afternoon following less than a weeks illness from pneumonia, were conducted at 1 Saturday afternoon in the home and at 2 in the Monticello Reformed church.

Became Ill Sunday

Mrs. Hefty's sudden and unexpected death came as a sad blow to both relatives and friends, few of whom were aware of the seriousness of her illness, having been taken ill on Sunday, only a few days before her untimely passing. Still an unusually active woman, Mrs. Hefty was taken ill with pneumonia and failed to respond to medical treatment. Although her many friends had known that she was ill none of them were aware that she would so quickly come to the end of her march down life's pathway. On Tuesday medical authorities removed Mrs. Hefty to the hospital, where, it was thought, she would quickly recover through hospital care. In her weakened condition, however, medical treatment failed to bring the hoped for response.

Native of Washington

A native of Washington township, Susan Stauffacher was a daughter of Conrad and Mary Elmer Stauffacher, having been born on the homestead farm March 10, 1885. She attended the Voegeli district school and had always lived in the Monticello vicinity. On May 6, 1908, she was united in marriage to Edward C. Hefty, Washington township. For a few years they made their home on the A. M. Hefty farm. Subsequently they moved a short distance south to the present Hefty home, where they have since resided.

Many Sterling Qualities

The untimely death of Mrs. Hefty has removed from our midst a woman of_many sterling qualities and news of her passing has occasioned sincere regret among a large circle of friends in her home community and elsewhere. She was not only a devoted wife and mother but an ideal neighbor who had always been held in the highest regard by those whom she numbered among her acquaintances.

Mrs. Hefty was a member of the Reformed church and the Washington township Ladies' Aid society.
