Services Held for Hazen A. Isely, 34

Former Mt. Pleasant Man Dies After Being Hurt By Herd Sire

Hazen A. Isely, 34-year-old Cadiz township farmer and son of Mr. and Mrs. Alfred J. Isely, residing about three miles south of Monticello, passed away in a Freeport hospital at 2 o'clock on Wednesday morning of last week as the result of injuries which he received when he was gored by a bull while doing chores Dec. 9.

Funeral services were held at 2 Saturday afternoon in St. John's Evangelical and Reformed church, Monroe, the Rev. Paul C. Kehle, church pastor, officiating. Burial was in Greenwood cemetery, Monroe.

Mr. Isely rallied to overcome a siege of pneumonia at the hospital which developed a few days after he had been gored by the herd sire, but other complications set in and his condition was of such a serious nature that attending physicians gave up all hope for his recovery 10 days or more before he died.

Native of Freeport

Hazen A. Isely was born Sept. 2, 1911, in Freeport, the son of Alfred and Emily Readecker Isely. In 1919 the Isely family moved to their present farm, a few miles south of Monticello, where he grew up. He attended the Elmer rural school near his home, and was confirmed in the Zwingli Reformed church, Monticello, in 1926. He was united in marriage in New Glarus Dec. 6, 1934, to Marie Ott. For the past eight years they had farmed in Cadiz township. Mr. Isely was a member of the South Wayne Masonic lodge and the Monroe chapter.

Surviving besides the widow are two sons, Nathan, 9, and Sheldon, aged 4; his parents; two brothers, Merle and Edwin, Freeport; and three sisters, Mrs. Glenn Benkert, Monroe, Mrs. Leonard Beadle, Jr. Madison, and Miss Lois Isely, Chicago. He was preceded in death by a brother, Karl.
