Mrs, Louise Klassy Passes Away After Lingering Sickness Funeral Services Held for Well Known Local Resident

Funeral services for Mrs. Louise Klassy, 85 years of age, well known Monticello lady, who passed away late Thursday afternoon at the Deaconess hospital, Monroe, where she had been confined for about five weeks with a broken hip, were conducted at 1.30 p. m. Sunday in the home of a daughter, Mrs. Fred Elmer, South Main street, and at 2 in the Reformed church.

Mrs. Klassy had made slow progress at the hospital and several days before her demise she was afflicted with double pneumonia, which subsequently caused her death.

Rev. A. Muehlmeier, church pastor, officiated and burial was in Highland cemetery. Pallbearers were nephews, as follows: Jacob M. Marty and Fred Klassy, New Glarus; Fred Klassy, Fred C. Karlen, Sr., Ed. W. Marty, and Fred C. Marty, Monticello, and Walter Marty, Belleville. .

Louise Marty was born in Newark, N. J., Oct. 19, 1851, a daughter of Melchior and Maria Salmen Marty. At the age of 4 years she accompanied her parents to Wisconsin, first settling in Brookfield. Later they came to Monticello, where they farmed six miles west of town. On Nov. 2, 1871, she was united in marriage to Henry C. Klassy, the ceremony taking place in New Glarus. Rev. J. T. Etter performed the ceremony. The couple made their home on a farm in Washington township for many years, moving to Monticello to reside in 1907. Mr. Klassy passed away some years later.
