BODY OF CASPER MARTY BURIED HERE TUESDAY

Death Occurs In San Francisco Hospital—Fourth of Family to Pass Away

Mr. and Mrs. Jacob P. Marty, living on Railroad avenue, mourn the death of their son, John Casper Marty, aged 42 years, who passed away in a hospital at San Francisco, Calif., on the 28th of March, following in illness of several weeks duration. The body arrived here Tuesday of this week. Brief services were held at the Marty home at 4 o'clock in the afternoon, conducted by the Rev. A. Muehlmeier, after which the remains were interred in Highland cemetery.

John Casper Marty was a native of Green county, having been born on the old homestead farm in York township on Feb. 28, 1882. He resided at the parental home until reaching his majority, attending the district school and assisting with the work on the farm. For some years thereafter he assisted his brother on the farm.

Of late years, however, he developed a liking for travel and his lust for that angle of life took him to many parts of the United States. He would usually spend his summers in Green county, but the advent of cooler weather would usually find him on the way to more congenial climes. Three or four years ago he wintered in Florida, but for the past two years he sojourned in California during the frigid months of the year. In 1903 he spent a number of months in Switzerland.

Last fall he went from here to Dakota where he engaged in farm work for a time. He was taken sick while there but subsequently recovered, after which he went to Missouri. Later he moved on to California. The last letter his parents received from him was written in February of this year. Some time ago his parents were notified that he was sick in a hospital at San Francisco, and only a comparatively short time later came the sad and unwelcome news that he had passed away.

The bereaved parents have the sympathy of many friends in the affliction that has overtaken them. Besides the sorrowing parents, the deceased is survived by one brother, Joseph Marty, who is still engaged in farming. He was the fourth of a family of five children to have answered the final summons. Two sisters passed away during the influenza epidemic a few years ago.
