

AGED CITIZEN EXPIRES.

R. S. Mosher Passes Away After Lingering Illness With Bright's Disease.

Mar 10, 1826 - Feb 25, 1904

Reuben S. Mosher, for many years a respected citizen of Monticello, passed away at his home in this village on Wednesday morning last, after a lingering illness. He suffered from Bright's disease and while he had been ailing for several months, it was not until recently that his case assumed a serious aspect. Although loving hands ministered to his every need and the best of medical skill was employed, the disease had encroached upon his constitution to such an extent that human skill was powerless to prevent its progress and for several days before the final summons came, all hopes of his recovery had been given up.

The subject of this sketch was born in Wyoming county, New York, March 10, 1826, On the 29th day of April, 1849, at Wethersfield, N. Y., he was married to Almina M. Johnson, and they moved to Green county, Wis., in May of the same year, settling on what is known as Green's Prairie, in the town of York. He was successfully engaged in farming for a number of years. In 1888 he sold his farm and moved to this village, where he continued to reside up to the time of his death. His first wife died several years ago and he was later married to Mrs. Alice Titus, who survives him. He is also survived by three children by his first marriage, namely: Edwin, of Minneapolis, Minn.; Eugene, of Blanchardville, Wis., and Mrs. Estella Hilton, of New Glarus.

Mr. Mosher was a worthy citizen and a kind hearted and accommodating neighbor and his death removes from the community one who will be sadly missed by many.

The funeral was held from the Advent Christian church at 1 o'clock Saturday afternoon. Elder A. E. Bloom officiating.
