Wm. C. Schuler, 75 Years of Age, Dies In Home at Madison
Burial Services Held Here For Ex-Washington Twp. Native

Funeral services for Wm. C. Schuler, 75 years of age, Washington township native and former well known Monticello resident, who passed away in Madison at 8 o'clock Saturday morning following a heart attack, were conducted at 2:30 Monday afternoon in the Monticello Reformed church. Interment was in the Railroad avenue cemetery. Rev. A. R. Achtemeier, church pastor, conducted the services.

Mr. Schuler had not been in the best of health for the past year or more and the heart attack, combined with advancing years, brought death early Saturday morning.

Native of Washington

William C. Schuler was born in Washington township Jan. 1, 1863, a son of Christian and Rosina Blum Schuler. He attended the rural school in his district. He was united in marriage to Nettie Heimstreet, the ceremony taking place Jan. 1, 1884. She passed away Dec. 31, 1920. He was later united in marriage to Mrs. Bertha Hacker, Madison, who survives him. For many years Mr. Schuler was associated with the business interests of Monticello. He entered his business career in the village under the employ of the late John Richards, who conducted a mercantile business. Later Mr. Schuler worked in a store owned by the late E. J. Blum and following that he was employed for many years by the Peoples Supply company. After moving to Madison a number of years ago Mr. Schuler gained employment in the Simon Bros. wholesale grocery company, a position which he had to give up some years ago because of his advancing years.

Through his many years of association with the business interests of Monticello Mr. Schuler gained the friendship of a great number of people, all of whom learned with sincere regret of the death of their friend and acquaintance. Mr. Schuler had always been regarded as an industrious and faithful employee and through his unquestionable honesty he established himself as a friend of every customer who entered the stores where he was employed.

Surviving besides the widow are two step-children, Doris and Montford Hacker, Madison; an adopted daughter, Mrs. F. M. Bartnett, Janesville; a brother, Casper, Monroe; four nieces, Mrs. E. A. Bontly and Miss Edyth R. Blum, Monticello, Mrs. A. W. Becker, Madison, and Mrs. Rose Panzei, Minneapolis, Minn.; and four nephews, Adam Schuler and W. E. Blum, Monticello, G. C. Schuler, Orfordville, and F. Wm. Schuler, Madison. He was preceded in death by his first wife and three brothers and one sister, John and Jacob, Monticello, Albert, Buffalo, N. Y., and Mrs. F. S. Blum, Monticello.

Mr. Schuler was a member of a Madison Lutheran church.
