

## **THERESA DOOLY, 73 YEARS OF AGE**

### **DIES OF ILLNESS,**

#### **Passes Away Friday P. M. Funeral Rites Held Monday**

Following a lingering illness, Mrs. Theresa Dooly, 73 years of age, highly respected citizen of this village for many years, passed away in her home in the northeast end of the village at 1:15 o'clock Friday afternoon.

Mrs. Dooly had been in failing health for the past several years and had been confined to her bed since Jan. 8th. Complications were the cause of her death.

#### **Native of Rock County**

A native of Union township in Rock County, Theresa Dooly was the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John and Catherine Rossiter, born Mar. 2, 1859. Her marriage to James Dooly took place in St. James' Catholic Church in Dayton on May 18, 1881. For many years the couple engaged in farming, living most of their life on the Dooly farm, two miles east of this village, and also residing for a time on a farm near Brodhead. In May 1916, the couple retired to Monticello where Mrs. Dooly had since made her home.

Mrs. Dooly was a kind and loving wife and mother whose immediate thoughts always concerned the welfare and comfort of her husband and children. She was a woman of many sterling qualities and will be long remembered by her many friends and neighbors.

Mrs. Dooly was affiliated with St. Patrick's Catholic Church at Albany and was also a member of its altar society.

Mrs. Dooly is survived by four Daughters, Mrs. May Koepke, of Madison; Mrs, Frank Clapper, of Sharon, Wis.; Mrs. Walter Evans, Footville; and Miss Gertrude, at home and three sons, William, of Janesville; and. Edmund and James, both of Monticello; one sister, Mrs. (?)la Jones, Philadelphia, Pa.; two brothers, M. L. Rossiter, Los Angeles, Calif., and Frank Rossiter, Blackfoot, Idaho; 10 grandchildren, and two great grandchildren.
